Dear friends, donors and volunteers,

We extend our heartfelt thanks to you for supporting LifeNets this past year. You helped transform one life after another by helping to provide University education and the opportunity for a career to almost 60 students in Latin America and Africa. You helped to provide medicine to impoverished Malawian and Zambian communities. You provided food security to approximately two hundred orphans who rely on us in Balaka, Malawi. Through our livelihood development program, you have helped people out of despair and poverty by providing them the tools for a self-sustaining income.

Our special thanks go to all the volunteers who have collected eye glasses and white shirts. Our thanks to those who have picked up and stored wheelchairs and those who helped load our container to Ukraine.

Since March 20 we have helped with the Tsunami disaster relief in Sri Lanka. We sent a family from southern California to that country to coordinate reconstruction. Thousands of families in Sri Lanka have lost their means of livelihood and homes. Through your contributions we have been able to build five homes and benefit 31 people with habitat and the means to again make a living.

On April 19th we sent another 40 foot container from Indianapolis, Indiana filled with medical supplies and equipment to the "Revival" Centre of Rehabilitation for Disabled Children in Chernihev, Ukraine. We have worked with this center before its opening nearly ten years ago. It's been wonderful to see the progress that they have made from humble beginnings to now being able to help more than 200 children at a time.

In addition to our international projects, we have an active wheelchair program in the United States. Through our web site we have received many donations of wheelchairs. Often these chairs are almost new. We then strive to match requests with the donated chairs. Last year we were able to match up many needy recipients. Currently we have more than 20 wheelchairs (power, pediatric and manual chairs) available to those in need in the United States. If you know of a need in this way, please let us know.
