We have a new Web site for matching wheelchairs. **In this program our greatest need is for more donated wheelchairs. Here is news for **federal employees**. LifeNets has been approved and accepted into the Combined Federal Campaign which starts every year on September 1 and continues through December 15. The CFC is the only authorized solicitation of employees in the federal workplace on behalf of charitable organizations. Please designate that you want your contributions to go to LifeNets International. Our charity number is 12238.

Also, on our Web site we have three easy ways to generate monetary contributions without donating any money at all. Please go to the new "Ways to Help" tab.

1. GoodSearch—By using GoodSearch to search the Web, you automatically contribute 1 cent to LifeNets for every search.
2. eBAY—You can easily donate a portion of anything you sell to LifeNets.
3. iGive—Shopping online. Sign up with iGive to give a portion of your purchase price from selected merchants to LifeNets.

Each of these methods has already helped LifeNets with contributions.

Our *Developing Nations Scholarship Program* is our most cost-effective program and one that gives returns for the remainder of the recipients' lives. We have added students in Ghana and Zambia this past year.

Concerned with the lack of educational and training opportunities for young girls in Kenya, a team of women headed by Rose McDowell in Houston have started a scholarship fund with LifeNets *Developing Nations Scholarship Program* to address the problem.

This program will help young girls continue their education from age 13 through 18. In most cases their education stops at age 12. After that, the family must pay for secondary school.

In the 2008 school year we will sponsor eight girls. The average cost is about \$750 per year. The funds will be administered through the *LifeNets Developing Nations Scholarship Fund*.
