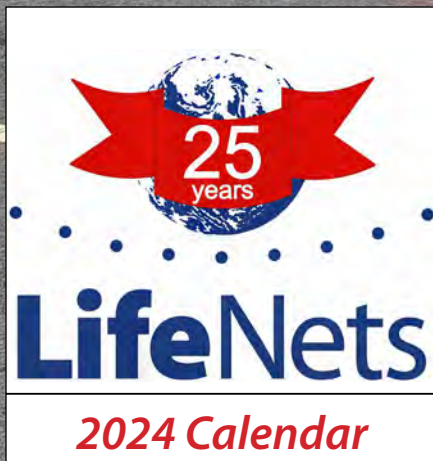


Delivery of water tank

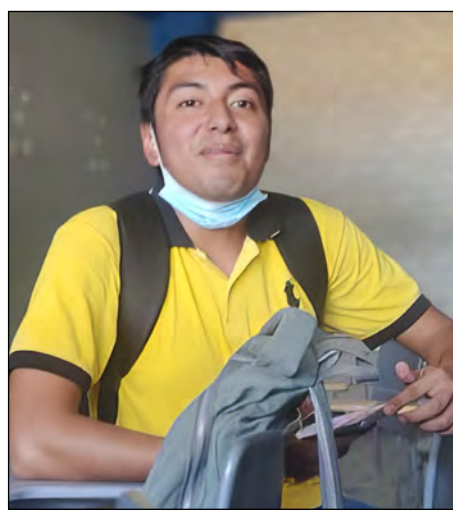

The cost of a borehole (water well) varies from \$3,000 to \$7,000 depending on location, water tank or no tank, and solar power or manual pump.
Wheelchairs	We have given away several hundred wheelchairs of various types, from basic models to motorized power chairs.
