Global outreach	The most effective way to help is financially. We leverage each donated dollar more than 20 times with matching funds, buying medicine at pennies on the dollar and via many other concessions.	LifeNets is a 501(c)(3) exempt charity, and tax-deductible donations can be sent by mail. Also, credit card and PayPal donations can be made easily. Wheelchairs	We have given away several hundred wheelchairs of various types, from basic models to motorized power chairs.	We are always in need of donated wheelchairs of all types since the demand is always more than the supply. Visit our automated Web site at www.LifeNetsWheelchairProject.org
Scholarships	We are now helping pay university tuition for about 40 young adults in developing countries. A very much appreciated and needed program.	Our continual need is to sustain this fund which costs \$55,000 a year to maintain the number of students in school. We need more sponsors.
Medicine	Every year our cost of shipping medicine to Malawi and Zambia is about \$10,000. This buys about \$130,000 in US wholesale value of medicine that is dispensed by our clinics in Malawi and for two remote communities in Zambia.	We need to raise \$10,000 a year for this ongoing project that is saving the lives of many children. It is dispensed through people we know and have worked with for many years.
Eyeglasses	We collect and then distribute eyeglasses in Malawi, Zambia, Sri Lanka and Karen refugee camps in Thailand.	Any collection of eyeglasses is appreciated. Please send nice clean used eyeglasses. Reading glasses are always appreciated as well.
