Highlighted below are just some of the varied projects that have met real needs and changed the lives of people and communities in 2019. Thank you for helping us to make a difference in these people's lives!

Developing Nations Scholarship Fund https://lifenets.org/programs/scholarships/ In 2019 LifeNets helped in full or in part over 100 students with Secondary school or University studies. The recipients were mainly in Africa, the Philippines and South and Central America. Thanks to the generous gifts from our donors we were able to continue with the commitment of over \$86,000 toward education. This provides opportunity for many who would not otherwise be able to go onto a higher education. We also help a few with their secondary education so they will be prepared to study further and develop a career. In addition we provide \$3,000 for school supplies for 90 children in Guatemala

In 2019, Lifenets Wheelchair Project was able to help those suffering from MS, paralysis, COPD, etc by transferring wheelchairs and other medical devices all over the US. We had a record year in matches which totaled 111. We were fortunate enough that a medical center in Twin Falls, ID donated many items to us that we placed in the nearby area. I'm amazed that many can benefit from these donations and then pass them on. Below is a story about of someone who could not obtain a wheelchair through insurance.

"My name is Anthony and I have a form of muscular dystrophy called charcot marie tooth. I've been looking at scooters for a while. I'm 39 years old and have had this disease since birth. I went on permanent dischility A years are My disease space words were in a red I have

nent disability 4 years ago. My disease causes muscle wasting and I have to wear leg braces to walk. I'm ok on my feet, I sometimes stumble and fall but it's hard to walk long distances and a scooter would help greatly. I have 5 children. I have 13yr old twins, a 10 yr old, and 8 yr old twins, all boys. One of my oldest has the same disease and just got back from California where he had major foot surgery so he would also benefit from it. "

We are able to fill a gap where unwanted or unneeded wheelchairs and other medical supplies are transferred to those who are desperate for them.

An entirely new grass feeding area has been developed. The cattle are being regularly vaccinated and a second fenced area for the cattle is being built. That way they can feed in one area while the grass grows in the other area.

meters. An Indian mark II pump was installed. The Situmbeko community is very grateful for the borehole as many people will draw water at a shorter distance than before. The community is thankful that now they have water closer to where they are molding bricks for a new church structure. They used to get water from a distance of



about two to three kilometers away for molding bricks."

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
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
